Editorial

After all, a clean slate isn't about erasing where you have been, but embracing where God is taking you.

Our Shepherd is without a Title

When you read the above caption your first reaction will be “Oh, has Fr. Warner been stripped of his position?” In reality, that is far from it. In fact, St. Pius X Church witnessed a Spirit-filled Induction Ceremony of Fr. Warner D’Souza as the Parish Priest; solemnized by his Lordship, Bishop Dominic Savio Fernandes on 20th June 2026.

The Second Vatican Council states: *“Pastors co-operate with the Bishop in a very special way as shepherds in their own rights, they are entrusted with the care of souls in a certain part of the Diocese.”* This is what Fr. Warner referred to in his induction speech “The appointment as Parish Priest, is not *an appointment of authority, but a role of responsibility, wherein he is entrusted with the souls of the Parish.*”

Hence, Fr Warner personally chose to drop the designation / title of Parish Priest. He chooses not to be overbearing and pretentious while attending to all the needs of the Parish, most essentially the spiritual growth; thereby aiming to fulfil the vow he took at his induction **“To ceaselessly care for the Lord’s flock under his care and to unite himself day by day to Christ, the Eternal Priest.”**



As part of the Induction Ceremony, Bishop Dominic Savio handed over to Fr. Warner the many responsibilities of the Parish. He was given the **key of the Tabernacle** in order for him to nourish the community with the Body of Christ.



He was led by the Bishop to

- **the Baptistry** – reminding him to bring God to the people through the Sacraments.
- **the Confessional** – as he needs to be an instrument of God’s love and forgiveness.
- **the Lectern** – from where the Word of God will be broken for the spiritual growth of the Parish.

Finally, the **Sacramental Registers** and the **Keys of the Church** were handed over to Fr. Warner, signifying the beginning of a new chapter in our Parish.

In keeping with the theme of this magazine ‘**New Beginnings**’, Fr. Warner endeavours to shepherd us into new beginnings - **to welcome all especially the least, the last and the lost.** To quote Fr Warner’s speech

again “We could all be prodigal even though we are sitting in God’s house.” He wholeheartedly wants every parishioner, even those on the periphery, to return to the Father. Taking a cue from Fr Warner may we embrace each

and every one, far and near, rich and poor so that the Parish under his guidance experiences the outpouring of Grace.

Restoration and Renewal in Christ

A railroad crossing had a clear big signpost that read **STOP-LOOK-LISTEN**. Yet another crossing had a slightly different signpost: **STOP-SEE-GO** – this was meant for the safety of the vehicles crossing that zone. Isn’t that what Renewal and Restoration really mean? It translates to **STOP-REFLECT-LISTEN-GO**.

The famous Papal Motto of St. Pius X, who dedicated his papacy to restoring Christ’s central role in the Church and society, was **‘To restore all things in Christ’** (from the Latin ‘Instaurare omnia in Christo’). This is rooted in Ephesians 1:10 and Revelation 21:5. It is the ongoing process of allowing Christ’s love to restore your life and the world.

We need to focus on the past (restore) to repair ourselves if we have drifted away from Christ. We also need to focus on the future (renew) breathing new life of renewal in Christ. This restoration and renewal IN Christ require us to go through a personal transformation, allowing Christ to transform us, rather than conforming to the patterns of the world. A true and effective personal transformation IN Christ takes place when we channel our efforts ‘Through Him, With Him and In Him’ as we pray in the Eucharistic Doxology at Mass.

LISTEN TO HIS VOICE: Everything we do and pray is directed to Christ. Our Blessed Mother in John 2:5 directs us to “*Do whatever He tells you*”, which becomes our spiritual motto for surrendering to the will of Jesus. **Restoration in Christ require us to receive absolution in the Sacrament of Reconciliation and receive Holy Communion.** St. Pius X encouraged the faithful to receive Holy Communion frequently with reverence, as this will sustain us and help us to direct our actions to the will of God – a nourishment that we need in order to focus our path towards Heaven and embrace an identity characterized by Holiness.

Renewal and Restoration of all things in Christ would also mean that we believe and put our trust in the promises of God (written in Scriptures, Tradition, and Magisterium of the Church). The world, through its New Age movements, is constantly bombarding us with artificial and worldly directions that lead us to a fear of missing out, confusion, worry and anxiety. **But, when we restore our faith in Christ and surrender to His plans, God will guide us and give us the ‘Wisdom’ to change our paths to His Kingdom.**

When worried, tensed or when in doubt – talk to Jesus. Sit before Him in the Blessed

Sacrament. Cast your anxieties and worries upon Him (1 Peter 5:7). Psalms 55:22 teaches us to “Cast your burden on the Lord, and He will sustain you and He will never permit the righteous to be moved.” Seek guidance from the Lord whenever you want to start something new or change or take a decision. Our **Lord promises us in Isaiah 58:11 – “the Lord will guide you continually.”**

In this fast-paced, mechanical world we need to STOP often, REFLECT where we are going, CORRECT our path (restoration and renewal), LISTEN to the Word of God for advice, healing and holiness, MOVE ON with His Grace and spiritual nourishment. Restore all things in Christ and Do whatever He tells you.

Fr. Ankit Baghel: The Good that Came Out of Amera

Our family was truly blessed to be present at Fr. Ankit Baghel's Ordination to the priesthood in the Order of Friars Minor (OFM) on 23rd April 2026. Memorable moments that will be forever etched in our hearts.

Fr. Ankit comes from a very poor family, who live in a tiny rural hamlet, two villages away from his Parish Church, Nitya Sahayak Mata, in Amera, a village in the district of Kawardha, Chattisgarh. This Parish has only seven Catholic families. **The Parish and the whole Diocese were celebrating because a “son of the soil” was being ordained a Priest for the first time!**

Vocations are nurtured in the family. We were very edified to meet Fr. Ankit's parents. Simple and holy people. They embraced the Faith when Fr. Ankit and his younger brother were still children, facing a lot of ostracism along the way. The elderly grandparents have also recently received Jesus. The entire family are so full of zeal and passion, and are very active in the Church.

The Eucharistic Celebration began with a grand Entrance Procession from the Parochial school to the Church, with

the people who came from all over the Diocese joining in the prayers and singing hymns.

The Choir came from a neighbouring Parish, a good eight-hour bus drive away. No dikhava of wanting to be seen in front! They were stationed at the back of the Church. They sang in harmony, truly praising and worshipping God.



Fr. Ankit was privileged to have both his parents proclaim the Word of God as Lectors at his Ordination Mass.

The Offertory Procession was filled with generous hearts – relatives bringing up simple gifts, the fruit of their labour, and the work of their hands.

As Fr. Ankit raised the Blessed Host and Chalice, proclaiming the words of Consecration, “This is my Body...”, **he was at Calvary, totally one with Christ,**

in persona Christi, giving up his whole self for all of mankind.

And that was the Faith we witnessed in the Priests and Parishioners of Avera, Chattisgarh. Amidst persecution, they boldly proclaim their Faith, wishing each other “**Jai Yesu!**”

The Sacrament of Healing: Anointing of the Sick

We conclude our Series on the Seven Sacraments that Christ instituted for His Church, by focusing on the second Sacrament of Healing - Anointing of the Sick.

“By the sacred anointing of the sick and the prayer of her priests the whole Church commends the sick to the suffering and glorified Lord, asking that He may lighten their suffering and save them” (Lumen Gentium # 11). As the title goes, it is anointing of the sick, a **Sacrament of HEALING** and not a death warrant.

When should one receive this Sacrament?

(Refer Catechism of the Catholic Church 1513 -1515 and Code of Canon Law, Canons 847 § 1, 1004, 1005, 1007)

As soon as anyone of the faithful begins to be in danger of death from sickness or old age, the fitting time for him / her to receive this Sacrament has certainly already arrived. The Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick is given to those who are seriously ill by anointing them on the forehead and hands with duly blessed oil ... - saying, only once: “*Through this holy anointing may the Lord in his love and mercy help*

you with the grace of the Holy Spirit. May the Lord who frees you from sin save you and raise you up.”

Can you receive this Sacrament more than once?

If a sick person who received this anointing recovers his / her health, he / she can, in the case of another grave illness, receive this Sacrament again. If during the same illness the person's condition becomes more serious, the Sacrament may be repeated. It is fitting to receive this Anointing just prior to a serious operation. The same holds for the elderly whose frailty becomes more pronounced.

Preparation of receiving this Sacrament (CCC 1516-1517):

- Like all the Sacraments, the Anointing of the Sick is a Liturgical and Communal Celebration.
- Only Bishops and Priests are ministers of the Anointing of the Sick. (CIC Canon 1003)
- The faithful should encourage the sick to call for a Priest to receive this Sacrament.

- The sick should prepare themselves to receive it with good dispositions.
- The Priests, family members / community, are invited to surround the sick in a special way through their prayers and fraternal attention.
- This Sacrament can be celebrated in the family home, a hospital or Church, for a single sick person or a whole group of sick persons. It includes laying of hands on the sick by the Priest. (James 5:14-15)
- Depending on the circumstances, the celebration of the Sacrament can be preceded by the Sacrament of Penance and followed by the Sacrament of the Eucharist.
- As the Sacrament of Christ's Passover, the Eucharist should always be the last Sacrament of the earthly journey, the "viaticum" for "passing over" to Eternal Life.

What are the positive effects of Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick?

CCC 1532 beautifully explains this as follows:

- i. The Special Grace of the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick has as its effects:
- ii. the uniting of the sick person to the Passion of Christ, for his own good and that of the whole Church;
- iii. the strengthening, peace and courage to endure in a Christian manner the sufferings of illness or old age;
- iv. the forgiveness of sins, if the sick person was not able to obtain it through the Sacrament of Penance;
- v. the restoration of health, if it is conducive to the salvation of his soul;
- vi. the preparation for passing over to Eternal Life.



When this Sacrament is received as viaticum in preparation for one's final journey, CCC 1525 explains - *"Thus, just as the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and the Eucharist form a unity called 'the Sacraments of Christian initiation', so too it can be said that Penance, the Anointing of the Sick and the Eucharist as viaticum constitute at the end of Christian life 'the Sacraments that prepare for our heavenly homeland' or the Sacraments that complete the earthly pilgrimage."*

A Choir for Every Mass

*An Interview with Hyacinth Rebeiro,
Coordinator of the Parish Choirs*

1. Our Parish is unique in that it has a different Choir to sing at every Mass, both for weekday and weekend Masses. How did this come about?

These different choirs came into existence only post-COVID, when

Churches were allowed to open with only a minimum number of people. Hence, Fr. George said that since the Mass they would attend, would be only once a week, let it be like a Sunday Mass, where there would be a musician accompanying the Choir. Since we had a number of Choirs, they

willingly agreed to sing once or twice a week, depending on their availability. However, as most of the Choirs could not make it for the morning Mass, either due to college or work, some of us singers came together and played / sang.

Before that, there was one Cantor in the morning and one or two Cantors in the evening for daily Mass. Also, there was not always a Choir for funeral Masses.

- 2. Singing at every Mass requires commitment and dedication from the Choirs. As Coordinator, how would you encourage the Choirs to stay motivated?**

Choirs in St. Pius are very dedicated and committed. They are always willing to help, whenever needed and are able to.

- 3. At times, singing at Mass can become a performance? What steps can be taken to avoid this from happening and that the Choirs stay focused on the sacredness of the Mass?**

This requires advice from the people in authority, else we may just continue to do what we have kind of picked up over the years, or learnt at training programmes. We now realise there is so much more that we don't know, based on the feedback we continue to receive from Fr. Warner. A training program will definitely help.

- 4. What steps should the Parish take to make the role of the Choirs more meaningful during the Mass? Do you think the Parish should organize periodic training programmes in Sacred Music for the choir members?**

A training program, especially talk on the meaning of the Eucharist, the sacredness of the Mass, voice modulation, not only for certain hymns, but also for the various parts of the Mass, should be some of the topics in the programme.

Many of the morning Mass Choir members are from the Prayer Group, where we sing, shout and clap our hands in joyful celebration. We are told that the Eucharist is the highest form of Praise and Worship and so we carry this forward to the Eucharist. We should be trained where to draw the line.

- 5. In coordination with the Parish team of priests, what activities can be organized for Choir members to grow in their relationship with God?**

A prayer service, Adoration where we can learn how to be still before the Lord and a recollection, preferably on a public holiday, like the one that is being organized on 15th August 2026.

- 6. For a while now, the Psalms are being sung from the Ambo at the Masses. Tell us something about this.**

Parishioners, who do not know why this is being done, think it is some new attention seeking mode. Fr. Warner, during the meeting with the different Choir heads, a month ago, had mentioned that the Psalms, if sung, need to be sung from the Ambo.

Since, many of our Choir members are not confident of facing the congregation and singing. he asked us to take our time, but to try and implement it. Some of us have begun doing this and are getting over our initial fears and now feel a little more confident.

Half a Century of Hope, Strength and Fellowship *at Alcoholics Anonymous*

What is the one thing that unites our dads, Anthony Hopkins and Eric Clapton? The answer - Alcoholics Anonymous (AA) helped pull them all from the brink and gave them a second chance at life.

It was 1976, Stany was sober for almost a year and had been attending AA meetings across Mumbai. AA had introduced him to the life-changing fellowship and healing that comes from embracing the 12 Step programme. He believed it was time that his Parish in Mulund also experienced the wonder that was AA and the catharsis it offers.

With encouragement from Fr. F. X. Lobo, our Parish Priest at that time, he started the **“Pious” AA group** on 10th May 1976, naming it to resonate with that of our Patron Saint. He carried the message of AA to families across the Parish along with his wife and daughters, inviting and encouraging people of all faiths who were struggling with alcohol addiction to join AA and discover that recovery and a return to a healthy life was truly possible.

For one of us, Stany was simply ‘Dad’, whom she watched in admiration as he turned his own recovery into a remarkable lifelong ministry in which through compassion and quiet dedication, he transformed countless lives. To the other, Stany was the man who changed the course of her father’s life. Through him, her father was introduced to AA and blessed with sobriety to start life anew. AA led her father to overcome his addiction, eventually marry and is, in fact, the reason her family exists at all today.

Along with Stany, and even after his passing in 1994, many generous members

dedicated themselves to carrying the light of AA in Mulund. Because of their loving example and honest dedication, hundreds who walked into an AA meeting room, completely broken and ashamed, rebuilt their lives and relationships after finding hope and healing. Fewer parishioners are finding their way to AA meetings now, but it is not because the problem has vanished. Alcoholism continues to devastate individuals and families, bringing pain, isolation and brokenness into homes.

Alcoholism is not a moral failing, but a disease influenced by genetics, life experiences and various psychological factors. When we understand this, we replace judgement with compassion and offer people struggling with alcoholism what they truly need - acceptance, encouragement and support. The most powerful part of AA is the fellowship that every member finds when they start to attend meetings. Recovery from alcoholism can feel like the hardest journey of one’s life, but AA ensures that you don’t have to go through it alone. Every meeting brings together people who have lived through the same struggle. Each of them understands the tremendous impact that this disease can inflict upon families, friendships and careers, not to mention the toll it extracts from one’s health and finances. The kinship among fellow members offers honest reassurance that others have traversed the same path and that you can too.

AA is one of the most welcoming communities anywhere in the world and also the easiest to be a part of. It simply opens doors and ushers in everyone who is seeking help. Across Mumbai around

140 groups meet regularly, many nestled within the Parishes of our Archdiocese. The help and support of AA extend to family members as well. The Pious Group also holds Al-Anon meetings for spouses, parents and children whose lives have been affected by a loved one's drinking. **Healing at AA is not just for the person with alcoholism; it is for the whole family.**

The 12 Steps of AA are deeply rooted in spiritual principles that resonate strongly with the Christian Faith - trusting in a Higher Power, humility, forgiveness, repentance and hope are at the heart of the programme. These principles are what anchor the path of every AA member making the journey that much more meaningful and powerful. The **Serenity Prayer** recited at every meeting room around the world, could easily be one that we can whisper in our hearts, ***"God, grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, the courage to change***

the things I can, and the wisdom to know the difference."

We have been fortunate to witness the gift of sobriety in our own fathers and experience the fellowship of AA firsthand with the warmth, friendship and hope that it brings. As the Pious group marks fifty years of service, we pray that anyone in our Parish carrying the burden of alcoholism, or watching someone they love carry it, will know they are not alone. **In AA, may they find what our fathers found: a place of welcome and healing, and the belief that a new beginning is always possible.**

Those seeking sobriety and their family members and friends walking the road with them are welcome to attend AA meetings held in the **St Pius X School building every Wednesday and Sunday at 7:30 pm.**

Moulding Children to be Good Citizens

An interview with Sr. Vivian and the CCO's Tuition Cell

1. How did the CCO's Tuition Cell come about and what was its aim?

The St. Pius X Community Centre was inaugurated by Bishop Ferdinand Fonseca on 26th August 2001, the day we celebrated our Parish Feast. On the same day we inaugurated the Tuition Cell. The Centre for Community Organisation (CCO) is the social service wing of our Parish.

We noticed that after school, children from marginalised communities were found playing outside, as their parents

were away earning a livelihood. With no one to control them and look after their education, the CCO decided to start the Tuition Cell for these children without considering their caste or religion. Our aim is to mould them to be good citizens. Some of our former students are now working with reputed companies. Whenever they come to meet us, they are full of praise for this initiative that we started years back.

2. Does the Tuition Cell cater to only Catholic children or children of all faiths?

The Cell caters to students of all faiths.

We have tried reaching out to Catholic students, but found the response poor. At present, only 2% of students are Catholic.

3. Till which grade and in what subjects does the Tuition Cell help the children?

We teach students up to the 8th grade in all subjects, from Monday to Friday. Most of these students are from local BMC schools. We try to inculcate values. We celebrate important occasions like Independence Day, Republic Day, Christmas, Diwali, etc. We also conduct handwriting, singing and drawing competitions for them and award prizes. Occasionally, expert counsellors from our Parish, counsel the students and parents. Feedback is sought from students and parents annually.

4. What measures is the Tuition Cell taking or planning to take to reach out to students from our primary section who have afternoon school?

We conduct regular classes from 5 pm to 6:30 pm, for which we have a dedicated group of volunteers.

Our primary section has afternoon

school till 6 pm. So, we have started tuitions for few students till 7 pm. We will need to have a separate morning or evening batch for these children. For this, we will need a separate set of volunteers. We will also require the principal and teachers to suggest students that need extra coaching and help.

Fr. Warner's suggestion of providing snacks to the students before the class starts would be a great initiative.

5. Tell us something about the volunteers who teach at the Tuition Cell?

We have a dedicated group of four ladies and a gentleman, who volunteer to teacher the 15 students that we currently have. The teachers are hardworking and highly motivated with zero absenteeism.

6. How can Parishioners volunteer to teach at the Tuition Cell?

Dedicated Parishioners can volunteer to teach our primary children by contacting me. My full support will be there with them. If I get at least one dedicated teacher, then I'm sure that the Tuition Cell will flourish.

The Sisters of the Cross at Khopoli, Divya Prabha at Thane and Vasai, Prerana at Rasayani, and Bethany Convent at Panvel were identified as the institutions that worked specifically in this area.

“This visit was a truly enriching and memorable experience, highlighting the amazing work the Ashram does in helping these girls build brighter futures,” said Sophia D’Mello from Community F, who visited Divya Ashram Vasai. The Ashram provides a safe home, education and life skills for about 30 young girls from less fortunate families.

“In the evenings, fearless Sr. Agnes scooters to the tribal villages in Khopoli, offering counselling, educational and skill support to the tribal women returning back home from their day jobs as labourers. Sr. Agnes is simply a superwoman,” said Lavina from Community M, who visited the Sisters of the Cross, Khopoli that supports widows and children from about 22 tribal villages in and around Khopoli.

By the end of our visits, we realised that we were not merely the ones giving — we were also receiving. **We came away inspired by the courage, resilience, faith and joyful spirit in service of the people we met.**

We sincerely thank every member of our Parish who contributed to this outreach. Your support enabled us to bring

encouragement and practical assistance to these wonderful institutions.

May this experience encourage each one of us to continue living our Faith through acts of love and service. After all, outreach

is not just an event on the Church calendar — it is a way of living the Gospel every day.

An interview with the members of St. Joseph's Sodality

The St. Joseph's Sodality is the newest association in the Parish. Tell us something about its inception and what this sodality is all about?

We are a group of men, who have consecrated ourselves to St. Joseph. We are privileged to call ourselves Warriors for St. Joseph. We meet once a week (Saturdays) to pray for the needs of the Parish.

What is the sodality's Manifesto?

The manifesto of the Sodality of St. Joseph outlines a Catholic spiritual movement for men, promoting the virtues of St. Joseph — like being a chaste protector, provider and worker. It functions as a call to spiritual arms to build up domestic churches, protect the Faith and live as exemplary Catholics in society.

Who are the members? Is it only for adult men? Do you have youth and children as members?

All MEN above the age of 18 are welcome.

What role does the Sodality play in the Parish?

The sodality is currently focused on praying for the needs of the Parish and planning activities for the wellbeing of Men, in a world where men are attributed to being silent and distant from family.

What activities does the Sodality plan for its members and for the Parish?

- Create a mature fraternity for men to share their struggles safely without the fear of being judged, learn the value of empathy, sensitivity and also pick up coping skills from one another. Encourage prayer buddies.
- Form a visible body of spiritually oriented men as a witness to other men of the Parish. One of the tangible steps in this regard is the plan to pray as a body of men in front of the Grotto.
- Coordinate a healing and spiritual wellness service for women, where men would position themselves as intercessors.
- Spread the consecration to St. Joseph and the consecration to Mother Mary in the Parish (offline and online sessions).
- Build a deck of testimonials on how the sodality has helped shaped the member's life.
- Encourage a similar spiritual sodality for women.
- Outreach to other men of the Parish in need of a spiritual and emotional anchor.
- Evaluate the success of the sodality through renewal - visible at the family level.

What are the Sodality's plans for the future?

To create a safe space for Men, where through prayer, fellowship and teaching we build a world where men can be more

like St. Joseph - Chaste, Firm, Prudent and Faithful.

Building a Christ-Centered Youth Community

An interview with Wyman and Vida Gonsalves, the new SPARC vice-presidents

What is your Spiritual Vision for the youth group?

Our vision is to build a Christ-centered youth community where every young person feels welcomed, loved and encouraged to grow in faith. We aim to help the youth develop a personal relationship with Jesus, actively participate in the Sacraments, serve others with compassion and become future leaders who live out Christian values in their daily lives.

How do your team's shared Christian Beliefs shape the way you guide and mentor the youth?

At the heart of our mission as the Core Team lies one unshakable truth: our shared Christian beliefs are the foundation of everything we do.

Before guiding others, we remind ourselves that all our efforts are for Christ and for His greater glory. Recognition or applause is never our goal; instead, we strive to reflect Christ's love, compassion and values in the way we mentor and serve the youth.

As SPARC – St. Pius Army for Christ, we see ourselves as Christ's army, not one that fights with cruelty or power, but one that stands for faith, hope, love and service. Christ is our guiding light, our strength and our refuge. We follow His example, helping others walk closer to Him.

Can you share an example of how your team successfully helped a teen integrate Faith into his / her everyday life?

One of our youth members initially attended meetings only occasionally and found it difficult to connect Faith with daily life. Through regular fellowship, mentoring, Bible reflections and participation in Parish activities, the individual gradually became more involved in prayer, volunteering and serving during Parish events. Today, the youth member actively participates in Church activities and inspires others to grow in their faith as well.

How do you ensure that newcomers and quieter youth feel actively included and valued in your group?

We personally welcome every newcomer and introduce them to the group. We encourage participation without forcing anyone to speak, and pair new members with friendly youth who help them feel comfortable. Through small group discussions, interactive activities and regular follow-ups, we ensure everyone feels seen, heard and valued regardless of their personality.

How would you motivate the youth to be involved in the life of the Parish? To be active members of other Cells and Associations in the Parish (e.g. Ushers, SVP, Legion of Mary, Bombay Catholic Sabha, Bible Cell, etc.)?

We would help the youth understand that serving the Church is a way of living out their Faith. By introducing them to the various Parish ministries, inviting ministry representatives to share their experiences and encouraging them to discover their talents, we can help them find meaningful ways to serve. We will also recognize and celebrate youth who actively contribute, inspiring others to participate.

What Spiritual and other activities have you'll planned for the youth this year?

- Monthly youth prayer meetings and praise and worship.
- Bible study and faith-sharing sessions.
- Retreats, recollections and Adoration.
- Community service and outreach programmes.
- Parish Feast and Liturgical celebrations.
- Sports tournaments and fellowship events.
- Leadership and personality development workshops.

What assistance would you require from the PPC and Parish for implementing your team's vision for the young?

We would appreciate:

- Continuous spiritual guidance and encouragement from the Parish Priest and PPC.
- Financial support for retreats, outreach activities and youth programmes.
- Access to Parish facilities for meetings and events.
- Opportunities for youth to participate in Parish ministries and decision-making.
- Support in promoting youth initiatives during Parish announcements and communications.

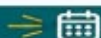
